HARRY EDWARD BOYD is editor of the "Cedar Rapids Gazette" and active in community enterprise in Cedar Rapids. Born June 15, 1904 in Washington, Kansas, Mr. Boyd is the son of James J. and Edwina (Pitcher) Boyd. His paternal grandfather, Hugh T. Boyd, was born in Armoy, Ireland, and died in Washington, Kansas. He was associated with the Standard Oil Company in that state. His wife, Margaret, was also born in Ireland and died in Washington, Kansas. The editor's father, James J. Boyd, was born in Crete, Nebraska, and died in Washington, Kansas, July 7, 1932. He was a salesman, and in politics a Republican. Edwina (Pitcher) Boyd, who was born in Washington, Kansas, and is now living there, is the daughter of Charles and Adelia (Hemphill) Pitcher. Her father, Charles Pitcher, a native of Kansas, was a contractor and builder and died in Washington, Kansas. His wife, a native of Toledo, Ohio, also died in Washington.

Harry Edward Boyd attended the public schools of Washington, Kansas, and the Sioux City High School, from which he graduated in 1921. The following year he was a student at Morningside College in Sioux City. He then became a professional musician for dance orchestras in Iowa and Illinois, and was employed thus for the next eight years. A part of this time, however, he was continuing his education. He studied at the University of Iowa from 1925 to 1929, graduating in the latter year with the degree of Bachelor of Arts. He then became associated with the "Cedar Rapids Gazette," of which he is now editor. He began as a police and city hall reporter, and after sixteen months became editorial writer. He was made associate editor about 1936 but continued as editorial writer until 1941, when he was made the editor of the paper. He has continued in that capacity ever since.

While at the university Mr. Boyd had been the editor of "Frival," the college humor magazine, and also of "The Daily Iowan." He was president of A.F.L., and a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Phi Beta Kappa and the journalistic fraternity, Delta Sigma Chi. He is a former member of the Young Men's Bureau of the Cedar Rapids Chamber of Commerce and at the present time is serving on the board of directors of that body. He is a member of the American Society of Newspaper Editors and of the National Press Club. Mr. Boyd attends the First Presbyterian Church, and is a Republican. He has been very active in welfare fund drives and other community activities. He is chairman of the Cedar Rapids Welfare Bureau and president of the board of trustees of the Cedar Rapids Library. He belongs to the Pickwick Club of Cedar Rapids and is vice president of the University of Iowa Alumni Association. Mr. Boyd's favorite diversion is fishing.

On June 17, 1925, Harry Edward Boyd was married to Dorothy Lowrie, who was born in Greenville, Idaho, September 3, 1904, the daughter of Avery R. and Pauline (Ray) Lowrie. Avery R. Lowrie, who was born in Centerville, South Dakota, is a retired railroad man, formerly associated with the Milwaukee Railroad. He is now living in Sioux City. Pauline (Ray) Lowrie was born in Marceline, Missouri, died in Sioux City in 1947. Dorothy (Lowrie) Boyd graduated from the Sioux City High School in 1921 and from the University of South Dakota in 1925, receiving the degree of Bachelor of Arts. Prior to her marriage she taught school in Montana and South Dakota.

HARRY MOREHOUSE GAGE, D.D., LL.D., president of Coe College in Cedar Rapids from 1920 to 1941 and of Linwood College in St. Charles, Missouri, until his retirement in 1946, has many friends not only in his home city of Cedar Rapids, but throughout Iowa. Dr. Gage was born October 15, 1878 in Franklin, Ohio, the son of Rev. John Lambert and Mary (Boynton) Gage. His father was a Presbyterian minister.

Dr. Gage graduated from the Academy of Iowa College at Grinnell, Iowa in 1896. He then entered the College of Wooster at Wooster, Ohio, and in 1900 was graduated from this institution with the degree of Bachelor of Arts. His first academic position was as dean and professor of Greek at Huron College in Huron, South Dakota, where he taught from 1900 to 1903. In 1902 and 1903 he studied Greek and philosophy at the summer sessions of the University of Chicago, and in 1903 became University Fellow in Philosophy at Columbia University. He was assistant in the philosophy department, 1903-1905, and he continued to serve in this capacity while pursuing post-graduate courses in philosophy. In 1905 he received the degree of Master of Arts from Columbia University, and later in his career the degrees of Doctor of Philosophy and Doctor of Divinity were conferred upon him.

In 1905 Dr. Gage began his career as dean and Armstrong professor of philosophy at Parsons College, in Fairfield, Iowa, and filled this post until 1912, when he returned to Huron College to assume the office of president. Dr. Gage was president of Huron College until 1920. In that year he came to Cedar Rapids, as president of Coe College, and for the next twenty years devoted his energies to that position. From 1941 to 1946 Dr. Gage was president of Lindenwood College in St. Charles, Missouri. He retired in June, 1946, and now again makes his home in Cedar Rapids, where he is enjoying a well-earned leisure.

Dr. Gage is a member of the University Club of Chicago, the City Club of New York, the National Arts Club of New York, the Missouri Athletic Club and the University Club of St. Louis, Missouri. He belongs to Phi Gamma Delta and Phi Beta Kappa college fraternities, which he joined in the College of Wooster in his undergraduate days. Fraternally Dr. Gage is affiliated with the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons and all degrees of both Scottish and York Rites and Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. He served as Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Iowa in 1924-1925. During World War I, while president of Huron College, he served as civilian inspector of the Student Army Training Corps, and from 1921 to 1926 he was a major in the Officers Reserve Corps. Dr. Gage and his family are members of the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A.

On August 12, 1912 at Newburgh, New York, Dr. Harry Morehouse Gage was married to Florence Louise Avery, the daughter of Henry and Louise (Ebbets) Avery. To this union were born five children: 1. Mary Boynton, on February 2, 1914. 2. Avery Morehouse, born June 16, 1915. 3. and 4. (twins) William Howard and Elisabeth Reid, born April 9, 1920. 5. Florence Louise, born October 14, 1924.
